1.1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Introduction:

Latur is known as an educational hub in Marathwada region of Maharashtra. It is a district headquarter. This city has a historical background. Earlier names of Latur found in historical records are Lattalur and Ratnapur. It is believed that Amoghvarsha the king of Rashtrakutas established this city, originally it was the native place of the Rashtrakutas. In the Post Independent period, it was the part of Osmanabad District which was formed by dividing Osmanabad district on 15th August 1982. Latur district is an abode of historical, religious and cultural heritages. Majority of the population is having agriculture as a major source of livelihood. Our parent institution, Manjara Charitable Trust, Latur is one of the well-known educational institutions in Maharashtra state. The presence of an educational network of the institution can be seen in Mumbai and Latur district. The visionary patron of our institution, Late Vilasraoji Deshmukh, Ex-Chief Minister of Maharashtra established medical colleges, technical institutions, teacher training colleges, degree colleges, junior colleges and schools under the umbrella of Manjara Charitable Trust, Latur.

Smt. Sushiladevi Deshmukh Senior College, Latur is established in 1991 to cater the educational need of the students from adjoining villages with different socio-economical background. The college is accredited with **B+** grade in Cycle - I in February 2004 and reaccredited with **B++** grade with **CGPA 2.80** in Cycle -II in September, 2014 by NAAC. 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Smt. Sushiladevi Deshmukh Senior College, Latur is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded. The college ensures an effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented process such as the preparation of the academic calendar, master time-table, departmental timetable, annual teaching plan, daily teaching reports (DTR), syllabus completion reports etc. The college organizes expert lectures through its respective departments to enhance the student's interest in their respective subjects. The faculties make optimum use of ICT resources for making the prescribed content interesting. To deliver curriculum, teachers use various ICT tools as well. The college has effective internal evaluation system through which performance of the students is regularly evaluated. The assessment is done through tests, tutorials, assignments, seminars, presentations, interviews, quizzes, vocabulary tests, group discussions and essay writing. Even the college has introduced inhouse value-added certificate courses which are also run in a systematic and planned ways. Twelve certificate courses were offered free of costs in different subjects during the last five years. The Institution follows the academic calendar and implements it strictly for continuous internal evaluation. Some of the faculty members are members of the Board of Studies in their respective subjects. The parent university has introduced a Choice-based Credit System (CBCS) in 2017-18. As per the directives of the parent university and the Govt. of Maharashtra our institution has prepared itself for the implementation of National Education Policy-2020 in the current academic year 2024-2025. The college gives much focus on the cross-cutting issues like gender equity, professional ethics like honesty, commitment, punctuality and character, human values like love, compassion, humanity, fortitude, fraternity, gratitude and forgiveness. The issues related to environment protection and conservation are also equally stressed upon while delivering the prescribed content. This emphasis on various cross cutting issues helps in making the student sensitive towards these issues which help to transform their lives. The college has developed a systematic procedure to collect feedback from Students, Teachers, Employers, Alumni, and Parents. The feedback is analysed and the action taken report is prepared for further improvement.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The admission process of the college is handled and monitored by the admission committee. Multiple subject combinations are available to meet the diverse need of the learners. The curriculum is designed by the parent university which is to be followed by the affiliated colleges. The university has given enough space for student centric teaching-learning methodologies such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies. Being single faculty Arts college, every department and the faculty make effective use of experiential learning method to enhancing the knowledge and skills of the students by providing the first-hand experience of the content. The departments like Geography, Sociology, History, Political Science, Public Administration and Languages give projects, field works so that the students are familiarized with life like experiences. Participative method of learning is reflected through the activities like group discussions, role plays, debates, quizzes, poster-making, exhibitions, student seminars which boost the confidence of the students. In order to develop collaborative competencies, the departments organize activities like preparing wallpaper and survey. The students are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops and presentations. Besides participatory and experimental teaching learning methodologies faculty exercise problem solving method which plays major role in shaping the logical and creative thinking. Problem solving methodology is realized through survey-based projects. The projects on environmental issues are also given to the students so that they can understand the importance of environment and ecology. All the faculty members make use of ICT tools for teaching-learning process. The hybrid mode of teaching learning is assisted with

different learning methodologies that help in making the content more interesting. The recorded video lectures and PPTs of faculty are made available in the library. During the pandemic situation, the teachers used virtual platforms for internal assessment and content delivery. The college conducts regular internal assessment through tests, quizzes, debates, seminars, group discussion and presentations. The mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and time bound. Cos and Pos are communicated to students and also displayed on the college website. IQAC of the college monitors all curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities by ensuring support services.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has devised an excellent ecosystem that facilitates research, innovation and knowledge transfer. It not only helps the faculty but also creates a space wherein students' ideas flourish. The college also makes available the required human resources and research infrastructure. The college has *Research and Development Cell* which acts as an incubation centre that propels research activities of students and faculty. This cell provides a platform which plays crucial role in creating perennial flow of knowledge and information. All the faculty are engaged in research activities and published 159 and presented 99 papers in national and international journals and conferences.

The college has organized following events during the assessment period.

- A *Skill Development Workshop*, A *Seminar on National Education Policy* and one day workshop on *Health Awareness*.

The college has collaborations with different institutions for sharing facilities, research and project works. In this way, the college, the Research and Development Cell and IQAC play prominent role in promoting research culture among the students and faculty.

The college is committed to the society so it always organizes the activities that are quite useful for the students and the locals. Various departments and NSS play crucial role in carrying out the extension activities not only in the college campus but also in adjoining areas. Besides organizing the yearly NSS camp in which different extension activities are organized. The college conducts useful communal activities such as cleanliness drives, blood donation camps, and women's gatherings are conducted to create awareness among students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College campus is spread over 6.07 Acres of land with required infrastructure for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The college has 14 well-furnished, spacious classrooms, two classrooms equipped with LCD projectors, one Seminar Hall, Geography Laboratory and Computer Laboratory. The administrative

Office, Principal's Cabin, IQAC, Library and staff room and Lady's common rooms, water cooler with purifier, borewell, and overhead tanks for water supply and enough parking space.

The College has a large playgrounds and long jump arena is 76x21m, 44x27m, 20x16m, 5x12m respectively. The college has a mammoth indoor stadium of 80x 130 sq. Ft. There are three badminton wooden courts. The carpet area of indoor sports complex is 10400 sq. Ft. It also has a gymnasium with modern exercise equipment. There is a running track of 400ms.

The college library is an important aspect of the teaching learning process. The college library uses OPAC. It has 16952 books and all the books are with bar code reader. It has also a reading room which has the capacity of 125 students. The total area of the library is 3600 sq. ft. which is divided in two sections; first section consists of the books and the other is of the reading room. The college has subscription of 11 Newspapers and 9 journals. The library also has the subscription of NList Consortia.

The IT infrastructure of the college comprises 35 desktops, 01 laptop, Pentium Core i3 and 7th generation microprocessor computers with a memory capacity of 2GB, an administrative office and various departments which have high-end configuration as Pentium core i5 processor, 8 GB RAM, 1 TB hard disk and 512 GB SSD and Operating System Window 10 and Window 7. The college has added 10 printers and 01 colour printers. The college has 02 photocopiers which provide scanning facility. The whole college campus comes under 40 CCTV cameras. The college provides 24x7 Wi-Fi facility through 05 Wi-Fi routers. The college has 04 LCD projectors and a biometric machine, 01 camera and 01 video camera. Physical facilities and educational resources are upgraded time to time.

Student Support and Progression

The college has effective implementation of scholarships and freeships provided by the Government. The admitted students are from poor socio-economical background so they are eligible to avail these facilities. 91% students have availed the benefit of scholarship offered by the Government during the last five years. The college works to promote capacity development through soft skills development, Language and communication skills, Life skills and IT trends awareness through curricular, co-curricular, and extensive activities. The college has various facilities such as competitive examination, career counselling, remedial coaching and Mentor-mentee Scheme for the welfare of the students. The college motivates students to participate in curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities such as sports, elocution, debate, and group discussion and other cultural activities. The department of Humanities and Social Sciences undertake different activities such as Literary Associations and Social Science Associations to provide an opportunity to develop creativity of the students. The college has established statutory committees such as Grievance Redressal Cell, Student Council, Anti-raging Committee, Suggestion box, Feedback Mechanism, Women's Development Cell, Yuvati Manch, Alumni Association, SC/ST/OBC/ Minority Cell. etc. The Institution has a mechanism for timely redressal of students' grievances. Percentage of progression to higher education is 70% during the assessment period. 06 students participated in sports activities at university and inter- university levels. 29 students participated in the university level Youth Festivals and a student Ms. Nishad Mustafa Shikalkar participated in the 26th National Youth Festival, 2023 at Hubli- Dharwad, Karnataka.

The Institution has a registered Alumni Association with registration number No. F-23408 (Latur) dated 08/09/2015. A meeting of the Alumni Association is held at the beginning of every academic year. The college has received Monetary and Non-Monetary contribution from the Alumni Association time to time. So far, the Alumni Association has donated the sum of the Rs. 6,02,135/- (Six Lakh Two Thousand One Hundred Thirty-

Five). The Blood donation camps also are organized by the Alumni Association every year. The Alumni Association has donated two water coolers, sanitary napkin disposer machine and three LCD projector.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is governed by the parent institution Manjara Charitable Trust, Latur which is one of the reputed educational institutions in Marathwada region. Smt. Sushiladevi Deshmukh Senior College, Latur is a unit of this institute which works sincerely to meet the vision and mission statement of it. All the activities and the practices of the college are evident to reflect the vision and the mission of the parent institution. Manjara Charitable Trust believes in the concepts of decentralisation and participation of all in the unit's smooth functioning to ensure efficient governance. The Governing Council of the trust consists of the respective members from different sections of the society. The President of Manjara Charitable Trust, Latur is the highest executive authority in the governance. The secretary is selected from among the members of the Governing Council. Executive body, College Development Committee, Internal Quality Assurance Cell, academic/non-academic departments, and their heads, teaching/ non-teaching staff work together in a decentralized and participative way for the smooth functioning of the Institution. The Principal is the head of the Institution. All the faculties and students are given representation in different college committees. The college has an e-governance system for the administration, finance and accounts, examination, and student support. The senior faculties of the college are appointed as the coordinators of the respective college committees. These committees work for the academic development of the college and try to fulfil its vision, mission, and objectives through various programmes and activities. The Institution has developed an appraisal system and feedback system to evaluate academic performance. Confidential report of teaching and non-teaching staff is maintained by the Principal. The parent university has conducted academic audit of the college in the academic year 2019-2020 and awarded 'A' grade with the score of 80.17%. All financial records also are audited by the CA and the Government Auditor regularly.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has co-education pattern so it takes several measures for gender equity on the college campus. The college organizes different curricular and co-curricular activities for gender equity and sensitization. The college conducts gender audit to take initiatives for the promotion of gender equity. The male female ratio of the college is 1:2.5. The college also provides equal opportunity for male and female teaching and non-teaching staff.

The college provides safety and security to the girl students through CCTV surveillance with 40 CCTV, a wall compound with gates for entrance and exit, installation of fire extinguishers in the main building and Library, *Damini Pathak* periodically visits the campus for the prevention of offensive activities and self-defence demonstration by the experts. In order to create conducive environment on the college campus, the college has established Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Committee, Discipline Committee, Women's Development Cell, Yuvati Mandal, Mentor Mentee Scheme and Career Counselling. The college organizes awareness programmes on Human rights, Rights of women in domestic problems and Cyber security. The college has counselling and mentoring system to take care of academic, emotional, social and cognitive development of the students. Emergency Helpline Numbers are displayed. Washrooms are provided with sanitary napkin vending and disposal machine for the safe and hygienic disposal of sanitary napkins.

The college has an excellent waste disposal system. The college makes optimum use of green energy by

installing solar panels LED bulbs and equipment which helps to reduce electricity consumption. The college has a functional Rain-water harvesting system through which the water from roof top of all college is collected and harvested near a tube-well. The college follows zero tolerance on use of plastic. Programmes are organized to orient students and faculty for the hazardous effects of plastic, pollution and addiction. Sant Gadge Baba Cleanliness Utsav (Festival) celebrated during the formal ten days of Ganesh Festival every year. The college organizes various programs on physical and mental health through NSS unit of the college. The college devised best practices like Sant Gadge Baba Cleanliness Utsav (Festival) and Institutional Memorial Excellence Prizes through curricular, co-curricular and extension activities.

To accomplish the Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary in the green levels at first NEP-2020 has introduced the Four Year Degree Programme at the Universities leading towards the Multidisciplinary Education under the Universal banner named Multiple Entry and Multiple Exits (MEME) Now our institution is trying to maintain the Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary approach by applying the UG & PG levels .Next year our affiliating University has proposed to implement the NEP-2020 neatly.</p>

Response:

Smt. Sushiladevi Deshmukh Senior College, Latur is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded which follows the curriculum prescribed by the parent university and the faculty who have been working as members of the Board of Studies (BoS) of the affiliating university actively participating in the curriculum designing.

The college has a well-planned and documented process for excellent curriculum delivery. Every department prepares its annual plan for content delivery in accordance with the academic calendar: prepared by the college. The college has constituted a committee which consists of senior and experienced faculty that prepares academic calendar which follows the academic calendar of the parent university. Every head of the department conducts departmental meetings in which workload distribution is done and the papers of the respective subjects are allotted after thorough discussion keeping in mind the interest and the specialization of the subject teachers. Each department prepares its academic calendar before the commencement of the academic year. The teachers prepare annual teaching plan of the papers which is strictly followed throughout the year. He/she also maintains Daily Teaching Report (DTR) for effective as well as planned content delivery. The teaching plan as well as the DTR facilitates timely completion of the allotted papers. The Principal calls meeting of teaching staff as well as the heads of the departments for supervising and assessing timely completion of the curriculum. He also observes the classes to ensure the effective curriculum delivery and gives necessary suggestions to the concerned faculty.

The college has a time-table committee which plays a pivotal role in the formation of the master time table of the college. The heads of every department also prepare the departmental time-table in consultation with their colleagues. Most of the faculty who are techno savvy make optimum use of ICT resources for making the prescribed content interesting which ultimately results into effective content delivery and student comprehension. Guest lectures are also organized to enhance the students' interest in their respective subjects.

The college has effective internal evaluation system through which performance of the students is regularly evaluated. The assessment is done through tests, tutorials, assignments, seminars, presentations, interviews, quizzes, vocabulary tests, group discussions and essay writing. The timetable of conducting these activities is also the part of master timetable as well as the departmental timetable. The internal evaluation is carried out throughout the year with transparency and impartiality.

The college has introduced inhouse value-added certificate courses which also run in the systematic and planned ways. The curriculum of these courses is prepared by the concerned faculty in consultation with the experts from other institutions. 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Response:

The college follows the prescribed syllabus of the parent university. Even though, the college follows university curriculum, the faculty gives much focus on the cross-cutting issues like gender equity, professional ethics like honesty, commitment, punctuality and character, human values like love, compassion, humanity, fortitude, fraternity, gratitude and forgiveness. The issues related to environment protection and conservation are also equally stressed upon while delivering the prescribed content. This emphasis on various cross cutting issues helps in making the student sensitive towards the various issues that largely affect their life as well as play vital role in transforming their lives.

Following are the courses in which cross cutting issues like professional ethics, gender, human values, environment and sustainability are stressed upon while delivering the content.

Professional Ethics:

While delivering the content in the subject like Economics, the concerned teacher emphasizes the need of professional ethics for successful entrepreneur. He stresses on the required behaviour and moral principles which are the corner stones of a commercial activity. He also acquaints the students with values such as honesty, integrity, respect, fairness and responsibility. While focusing on these ethics, he also explains the importance of maintaining trust between professionals and their clients, employers and the public. He also highlights the relations between the professional ethics and wellbeing of an individual or a group.

Human Values:

The History teacher while delivering the content presents the importance of decision making, character and hard work by giving the examples of historical events and personalities. The human values like love, compassion and mercy which are not followed by the individual or the empires have been ruined are corroborated by the historic events. All language teachers like English, Hindi and Marathi familiarise the students with human values by giving examples from the prescribed literary genres like drama, novel, poetry and short stories. They explain it in detail by highlighting the events: tragic and happy from the lives of the central characters of these works.

Gender:

The Sociology teacher while delivering the content presents the importance of gender equity which is

essential for the peace and tranquillity in society. Respect for the weaker as well as the marginalized section from students is stressed upon by the teacher while teaching. The teacher of Political Science and Public Administration stress the need of gender equality and the constitutional provisions that are incorporated in Indian as well as the constitutions of most of the countries.

Environment and Sustainability:

Environment protection and conservation is the burning issue of the present time. The world is on the verge of extinction, if immediate measures are not taken to protect the environment. The Geography teacher acquaints the students not only with the hazards that are caused by the humans to the environment but also the measures taken by a few individuals, groups and countries to make this planet a beautiful place for ours as well as the next generation. While teaching agriculture, the teacher familiarizes the students with the judicious use of pesticides and fertilizers.

Response:

Teachers use diverse student centric methods for effective curriculum delivery as there is diversity as far as the social, educational and financial background of students and their abilities are concerned. The teaching methodologies are used to enrich and widen the learning experience of students and make the teaching learning more outcome based and interesting.

Experiential Teaching Method:

As the college is single faculty college i.e. Arts every department and the faculty make effective use of experiential learning method which plays vital role in enhancing knowledge and skills of the students by providing the first-hand experience of the content. The departments like Geography, Sociology, History, Political Science, Public Administration and Languages give projects, field works so that the students are familiarized with life like experiences. The Department of Economics organizes field visits like visits to bank as well as industry visits. The Department of History through its excursion and study tours to historic places acquaints the students with the content delivered in the classroom. The person in charge of computer lab provides hands-on training and familiarizes students use of various softwares. Most of the departments assign projects and survey. The students are encouraged for presentation through exhibitions, poster making, screening of dramas and documentaries. The college emphasizes the motto 'learning by doing' by organizing various activities which are able to give learning experiences to the students.

Participative Learning:

- The students are encouraged for their participation in activities like group discussions, role plays, debates, quizzes, poster-making, exhibitions and student seminars which are able to boost their confidence.
- For developing collaborative competencies, the departments organize activities like preparing wallpaper and survey.
- The students are encouraged to organize students' seminars and they are to participate in various events like debates, seminars, conferences, workshops and presentations.
- The students are not only appreciated but also given prizes and certificates in the competitions like debates, seminars and role plays etc.

Problem solving methodologies:

Besides participatory and experimental teaching learning methodologies faculty exercise problem solving method which plays major role in shaping the logical and creative thinking. It also develops interest of the students in the curriculum. This methodology is realized through the following activities.

- Every department assigns field and survey-based projects to the students.
- The projects on environmental issues are also given to the students so that they can understand the importance of environment and ecology.

Use of ICT tools:

The ICT tools enhance the quality of teaching-learning. Most of the classrooms are well equipped with ICT tools like projectors. The college has internet connectivity of 100 Mbps with Wi-Fi. The teaching learning becomes more interesting because of the use of ICT like LCD projectors, digital cameras and YouTube. The hybrid mode of teaching learning is assisted with different learning methodologies that help in making the content more interesting. The recorded video lectures and PPTs of faculty are made available in the library. During the pandemic situation, the teachers used virtual platforms like Google Classroom, Google Meet, Zoom, Webex for internal assessment and content delivery.

The college conducts regular internal assessment. It organizes tests, quizzes, debates, seminars, group discussions and presentations. Besides conducting internal exams, the college takes utmost care in maintaining transparency and impartiality in the assessment process. The college has Continuous Internal Evaluation Committee which is headed by Mrs. S. G. Pawar. It monitors the smooth and timely conduction of the internal examination. The college follows C

hoice Based Credit System (CBCS) as per the directives of the parent university. The college has constituted a committee for preparing a calendar for Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) which prepares the calendar at the beginning of academic year. It has the details of conducting unit tests, seminars, group discussions, home assignments and projects.

The external evaluation is done through the university examination which provides question papers through secured online question paper delivery. The college appoints **Chief Superintendent (CS), Assistant Chief Superintendent (ACS) and JCS** is appointed by the parent university. The impartiality in the examination is monitored through internal squad, JCS and university flying squad. The answer

books are submitted to the D-CAP which is formed by the parent university. It organizes the assessment of all answer books of courses by appointing teachers of the concerned subjects from the affiliated colleges. The assessment work is done in the stipulated period of time. Results of the external examination are displayed on the university website.

The mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and time bound. The students are provided with answer books of their internal examinations for further improvement. The college strictly follows transparent evaluation process and zero tolerance is followed regarding favouritism.

Implementation of efficient mechanism:

The college followed the virtual platforms like Google forms for internal evaluation during COVID-19 pandemic. The question papers of online as well as offline examinations are preserved in the library and in the respective departments.

Grievance Redressal System:

The college has *CIE Grievance Redressal Committee* headed by the head of the institution which consists of three members to ensure effective and impartial examinations. It takes care of the students' grievances regarding internal examinations. After declaration of CIE results the students are free to air their grievances if any. The dissatisfied students can make a written complaint regarding the assessment of one or all papers to the concerned committee which is bound to redress the grievance in a timely manner. The Principal calls the urgent meeting of the committee to address the issue. The complainants answer books are given to the concerned subject teachers for reassessment. The changes in the marks, if any are communicated to the CIE Grievance Redressal Committee for further process.

For external examination, the students may apply for reassessment of their answer books within stipulated period of time after the declaration of the result in prescribed format. If any change in marks is found after rechecking and revaluation, new marksheet is issued to the students by the university.

Response:

As the college is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded, it follows the

curriculum designed by the university. The college is a single faculty college i. e. Arts and offers only B.A. programme. The college prospectus and website reflect thorough details of the courses. Every faculty as well as the departments prepare programme outcomes, course outcomes and programme specific outcomes and accordingly the teaching plan and other content delivery mechanism are formulated. These decided POs, Cos and PSOs are not only displayed on the website but also conveyed, explained and analysed. The students are also informed about it during the lectures. Even the procedure of assessing the attainment of outcomes is also discussed with students.

Besides, following the COs and POs decided by the parent university, the college also set some COs and POs for the courses which are run by it. Here, the departments and the concerned faculty play vital role in formulating and devising the mechanism for its attainment. The COs and POs are finalized only after thorough discussion with faculty, Principal and subject experts from another institute. All the department heads and its faculty devise co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in such a way that the attainment of COs and POs become feasible. The college follows the UGC guidelines and accordingly POs and COs are designed.

These COs and POs are designed in such a way that it ensures thorough comprehension of the programs and courses which are framed by the parent university as well as the college. It provides the benchmark by which the performance of the students is assessed. Even after the finalization of POs and COs by the respective departments, IQAC also makes some suggestions regarding the addition as well as the deletion of POs and COs if any. All the POs and COs are unanimously accepted and displayed on the college website, departmental boards and communicated to the students by following ways:

1. The set POs and COs are shared with students by using social media platforms like WhatsApp.
2. They are communicated to the students at the beginning of every academic year.
3. The subject teachers discuss it during the lectures.
4. A hardcopy of the POs and COs is also shared with the students if he/she asks.
5. All the POs and COs are compiled and placed in the form of a booklet in the college library as well as in the respective departments.

The Course Outcomes (COs) provide much needed knowledge and skills to the students. **It defines the cognitive processes a course provides.**

Summary of POs and COs:

The college offers undergraduate programme in Humanities and Social Sciences i.e. B.A. The programme has many subjects like English, Marathi, Hindi, Economics, Environmental Studies, Political Science, Public Administration, Sociology, Geography and History. These courses consist of social behaviour and responsibilities, human values, creativity, linguistic and language skills, universal culture, professional ethics, resource management, environmental protection, conceptual understanding, analytical thinking and research attitude.

After completing the programme or the course, it is expected from the students that they should have mastered the expected skills and knowledge which is given by the subject teacher and this attainment of objectives are primarily measured by the attainment of COs and POs. The effectiveness of a course and the teaching-learning evaluation process mainly depends upon the attainment of COs and POs.

The Process of Judging the Attainment of COs and POs:

Learning objectives of the programme and courses are important factors in determining the COs. Different parameters are devised for evaluating the attainment of COs. The data of attainment of Cos is mainly analysed so that one can understand the set COs are attained or not. After finding out that the predetermined COs are attained, these COs are mapped to the programme outcomes.

Attainment of COs and POs:

Various assessment methodologies are utilized for assessing the attainment and mastery of the students to the course outcomes. There are two assessment methods: direct and indirect method which are useful in the attainment of COs and POs.

Direct method:

This method uses following assessment parameters for the attainment of COs and POs. Our college conducts two internal evaluation tests in first semester and two in second semester. Besides the tests, every department gives assignments, tutorials and projects. It also organizes debates, group discussions, quizzes, presentation, essay writing competition, elocution competition and seminars. Even the project work and field work are also important parts of assessment process. The external assessment is done through the university examination in which the whole performance of the students is evaluated and determines the attainment of POs and COs. The university examinations are conducted twice a year. These assessment tools are important in measuring the attainment of COs and POs.

Indirect method:

Assessment parameters for the attainment of COs and POs.

- **Exit Survey:**Every year, the college conducts an exit survey from the pass out students' which is quite helpful in understanding the level of the attainment of COs and POs.
- **Placement:**In spite of a single faculty conventional college, it organizes placement camp in which more than Twenty-Eight students were placed in different companies during the assessment period. This assessment tool also helps in understanding the level of attainment of COs and POs.This method uses following assessment parameters for the attainment of COs and POs.
- **Student Progression:**

After completing the graduation from this institute ninety-five students moved to higher education which is also the testimony of successful attainment of COs and POs.

- **Awards:**

Students from the Department of Sports have brought laurels in Boxing, athletics and volley ball at university and state level. The five NSS volunteers excelled in Sate as well as Interstate Level NSS camps as the Best Volunteers.

The college has devised an excellent ecosystem that facilitates research, innovation and knowledge transfer. It not only helps the faculty but also creates a space wherein students' ideas flourish. The college also makes available the required human resources and research infrastructure. The college has Research and Development Cell which acts as an incubation centre that propels research activities of students and faculty. This cell provides a platform which plays crucial role in creating perennial flow of knowledge and information. The college has organized two One Day workshops on 'Intellectual Property Rights' on 20.08.2018 and 06.09.2019. The College is formally linked with the Incubation centre of Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded.

The college also encourages faculty members and students to participate in the conferences, seminars and workshops in order to boost their research cravings. The college faculty also creates YouTube videos of the content which are quite useful for students not only of this institution but also the student's community. All the faculty are engaged in research activities and published 159 and presented 99 papers in national and international journals and conferences.

The college has organized workshop in association with the parent university, Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded on newly introduced *CBCS pattern for B. A. First Year* on 6th August, 2019. More than one hundred and fifty-five students and the concerned teachers attended the workshop. The college also has organized one day workshop on '*Intellectual Property Rights and Patent Filing*' which was organized on 14th September, 2019 in which forty-five research scholars, faculty and the budding writers participated. Keeping an eye on the use of information and technology for effective teaching learning, the college organized a workshop on *E-content Development* on 3rd and 4th January, 2020. The workshop was inaugurated by the honourable Vice Chancellor Dr. Udhav Bhosale of the parent university. The workshop received mammoth response from the academic and student community. More than three hundred and fifty-five participants from various institutions participated in the event. Our college also hosted a *National Level Faculty Development Workshop* in association with EdFly Learn (Learning Management Solution) on e-learning for the faculty. The workshop which was organized on 27th May, 2020 was attended by forty-five faculty from different institutions. 4.1.1

Response:

The College campus is spread over 6.07 Acres of land. It ensures adequate availability of the required infrastructure for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. It makes optimum utilization of physical infrastructure for teaching learning activities. It has 14 well-furnished, ventilated and spacious classrooms. Four classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors which are also used for conducting theory classes. The college also has technology enabled learning facilities. The college has one seminar hall and it is regularly used for conducting various seminars, conferences, presentations and academic workshops. The Computer and Geography laboratories provide state of the art equipment and facilities and are used for disseminating first and academic experiences and also useful for conducting practical. The college has 35 computers. The computers student's ratio is 1:5. Every department is well-equipped with computers. The whole campus comes under Wi-Fi connectivity. The administrative Office, Principal's Cabin, IQAC, Library and staff room and Lady's common rooms are Wi-Fi enabled with 24/7 internet facilities, with the bandwidth of 30 mbps. The 1800 sq. ft. Central Library is computerized and automated. It has 16952 books and all the books are with bar code reader. It has also a reading room which has the capacity of 125 students.

Besides the core courses, the college encourages extra-curricular activities like sports and culture. It has adequate and well-maintained infrastructure for sports, games and cultural activities. There are different arenas for different sports like volleyball, Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, long jump. College has large playgrounds where multiple games like Athletics, Volleyball, Kho-Kho and Kabaddi are played. The size of the volleyball, Kho-Kho and Kabaddi, Long jump arena is 76x21m, 44x27m, 20x16m, 5x12m respectively. The college has a mammoth indoor stadium of 80x 130 sq. Ft. where sports like badminton, volleyball, carrom, table tennis and chess are played. In the Indoor, more than 12 Students play at a time. There are three badminton wooden courts. The stadium opens in the morning from 5.30 to 9.30 and also in the evening from 4.30 to 8.30 wherein more than 60 students play. The college also conducts a summer camp in the month of May every year wherein badminton training sessions are organized for the students. The college has constructed an auditorium wherein most of the cultural events are organized. The college organizes YOGA and pranayama sessions in the morning where large number of locals, students and faculty enjoy the health tips given by the experts and trainers. The indoor stadium facility is also provided to the other institutions run by the Manjara Charitable Trust, Latur. The carpet area of indoor sports complex is 10400 sq. Ft. It also has a gymnasium with modern exercise equipment. There is a running track of 400 mtrs. The college organized following sports events.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS),

adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The college library is one of the most important constituents of the teaching learning process. It is the major avenue that provides access to knowledge which ultimately disseminate the required impetus to students and faculty for academic and research activities. The library provides the much needed academic and research acceleration to all the students, faculty by providing much needed resources and the whereabouts of the sources. The library has been playing its crucial role since the inception of the college i.e. 1991. The total area of the library is 3600 sq. ft. which is divided in two sections; first section consists of the books and the other is of the reading room. There are further sections in the library for periodicals reference books, textbooks. There is separate section for faculty and girl students. The seating capacity of reading hall is 125. The college also provides access to Smt. Sushiladevi Deshmukh Mahila Mahavidyalaya, Latur, alumni and researchers.

The college has subscription of 11 Newspapers, 9 journals i.e. India Today, Panchdhara, Akshargatha, Akshar Vaidharvi, Vicharshalakha, Bhugol Sanshodhan Patrika, Aandolan Shaswat Vikasathi, Shikshan Sankraman, Satyagrahi Vichardhara and The Deccan Geographer in Hindi, Marathi and English languages. There are 3 computers in the library which are useful for automation and providing access to students to the e-resources. The college library uses the Libman Library Management software developed by Master soft cloud, Nagpur for the automation of library. E-resources are also used by the library. The library has the subscription of NList Consortia. The library encourages faculty and students for the use of E-Resources like e-Books and e-Journals which are available at free of cost. The college also felicitates the student as the Best Reader to encourage the reading culture among students. The library also provides the services like Book Bank, Free Book Bank Facility to all the students. The college library has collection of 16952 Books which includes 8884 Text Books of worth Rupees 1104713/-and 7443 Reference Books of worth Rupees. 2409478/-

Optimal use of the library:

The college has state of art IT infrastructure which is found in various subject departments, library and administrative unit of the college. Besides providing the IT facilities the college always updates the IT infrastructure so that it can cope with the changing scenario. These IT facilities provide support in teaching learning as well as play crucial role in meeting the challenges as well as opportunities germinated through the new as well as the existing curriculum, administration, assessment and evaluation system. As most of the faculty are techno savvy which make optimum use of IT resources so that the IT infrastructure provide by the college requires frequent upgradation. Every year college adds computers and digital devices to its existing IT infrastructure. The college has 35 desktops and 01 laptop. It has Pentium Core i3 and 7th generation microprocessor computers with a memory capacity of 2GB. The college has changed the old operating system like XP to enhance the system efficiency. Now, most of the computer systems have Window 10 and Window 7 operating systems. It not only updates the operating systems but also the computer configuration is frequently updated. No pirated operating system or any software is used in the college. Even the college orients the faculty and students about its possible ill effects. An administrative office and various departments which have high-end configuration as Pentium core i5 processor, 8 GB RAM, 1 TB hard disk and 512 GB SSD and Operating System Window 10 and Window 7. The college hires the services of a well reputed firms Omsai and Atharva Computer Solutions, Latur which looks after the maintenance, updation and installation of different softwares. The college has also a committee which takes care of the requirements of IT infrastructure maintenance and updation. The college has added 10 printers and 01 colour printer. The college has 02 photocopiers which provide scanning facility. The whole college campus comes under 40 CCTV cameras. The college provides 24x7 Wi-Fi facility through 05 Wi-Fi routers which provide uninterrupted internet access for students, teachers and administrative blocks.

Every department in the college has 24x7 internet access. The college has 04 LCD projectors. The college has biometric machine for recording attendance of teaching and non-teaching staff. Every computer in the computer lab as well as in the administrative block is connected by Local Area Network (LAN). The college has 01 camera as well as 01 videocamera through which excellent recording of lectures is done. The college library uses OPAC. The college has made major strides in providing as well as updating IT facilities from 2018.

Recruitment process is carried out as per the rules and regulations of UGC and Government. Being one of the reputed institutions of the state, job security, transparency and parental care are the speciality of our management. This feature of management attracts faculty and other staff having required qualifications, experience and skills.

Service Rules:

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The college is affiliated to the Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded. College is grant-in-aid and included under section 2(f) and 12(b) Act 1956 of University Grants Commission, New Delhi. Therefore, it is eligible to receive the grants from various schemes of UGC, New Delhi and the State Government. In last five years, the college has not received funds from any of the funding agencies.

Financial Sources of the College:

1. Salary grant from State Government.
2. Admission fees from students as per the fee structure described by affiliating university.
3. Financial and non-financial support of the Alumni.
4. Financial assistance by the Manjara Charitable Trust, Latur for infrastructure development.

Procedure for optimal utilization of resources:

The parent institution, Manjara Charitable Trust, Latur monitors utilization of financial resources of the college. The Principal reviews the budgetary provision for the academic year. The administrative office prepares budget under the guidance of the Principal and is presented in College Development Committee (CDC) meeting for approval. The CDC gives approval considering financial position of the college. Finally, it is sent to the parent institute for final consideration. The college maintains account of all financial transactions. The college aims at optimal utilization of infrastructure, library and human resources.

The college has a mechanism for internal checking through continuous auditing of its financial transactions. Finance and accounts are maintained systematically. The internal audit is conducted at the end of financial year. External audit is conducted once in a year at parent institute level. Chartered accountant is appointed for the audit.

Regular internal and external audits are carried out as follows:

1. Internal Audit by College Administration.

1. External Audit by the Chartered Accountant.
2. Joint Director - Salary and non-salary audit.
3. Senior Auditor of Higher Education – Financial Audit.

Internal Audit:

The internal audit by College Administration is done regularly and it is a continuous process. The receipt of fees collected from the students, the official funds and the official expenditure is checked by College Administration. At the payment level the purchase bills and other payment vouchers are created by the accountant and signed. The office superintendent and Principal of the college finally sign the payment vouchers and later on they are entered in the cash book and respective ledgers.

External Audit by the Chartered Accountant:

The external audit is carried out annually by the end of each financial year by the college, through the chartered Accountant **M/s. S. H. Kocheta & Associate, Chartered Accountant, Latur**. All the last Audit Reports given by the Chartered Accountant are available in the Administrative Office the college. External Audit by the Joint Director and Senior Auditor, Dept. of Higher Education is also done by the college. The financial audits of N.S.S. is also done regularly.

After completion of the college audit by external auditor, the Audit Report is kept in the College Development Committee meeting and finally submitted to the parent institute. In the last years no major audit objection are noted by the external auditors.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays vital role for the quality enhancement of the college through academic activities of the college. It functions for planning and initiation of all strategies and processes for quality maintenance. It prepares plan for quality enhancement and academic excellence of the college. IQAC bears the responsibility of planning, monitoring, and executing different activities for quality assurance. IQAC has been trying to implement number of quality assurance strategies such as digitalization of academic and administrative facilities, gender equality, strengthening extension activities etc.

IQAC prepares academic calendar at the beginning of every academic year and shares it with the faculties and students. It organizes capacity building training programmes for the students and training workshops for teaching and non-teaching staff.

During the assessment period, college introduced twelve value added certificate courses. Efforts are constantly made to enhance research culture among the students and the faculties by organizing college level workshops on Research Methodologies. IQAC organized five college level workshops on the Research Methodologies during the assessment period. The students are encouraged to opt for projects through respective departments. IQAC ensures participation of the students in different college committees constituted for each academic year. Thus, students are got involved in the decision-making process of the college. IQAC plans CIE Policy to map attainment of learning outcomes.

IQAC encourages the respective departments to organize different activities to evaluate the learning outcomes. The examination committee of the college conducts Internal Tests, Tutorials, Assignments, Group Discussions and Student seminars. The students are informed about revised examination pattern of the university.

IQAC collects feedback from time to time from the students and analyses it for further improvement of teaching learning process. This procedure helps IQAC to make timely suggestions to the faculties for making use of technology to enhance the interest of the students in learning. The college has organized different activities considering the feedback collected from its stakeholders. The feedback mechanism thus helps IQAC to make further planning for quality assurance.

IQAC has been restructured after post-accreditations as per the NAAC guidelines. IQAC works for

strategic planning and its implementation through positive interactions with the respective departments. It has developed a review mechanism of the activities. IQAC holds four meetings in the academic year to ensure quality enhancement of the institution. IQAC encouraged the faculties through the head of the institution to come forward for introducing new certificate courses and different activities. Finally, the Principal seeks approval from the CDC in time for IQAC's strategic planning and communicated the same to the respective departments.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, IQAC encouraged the faculty members to conduct classes through virtual platforms like Zoom and Google Meet Apps. Three Online National Level workshops were organized whereas 13 college level, university level workshops were organized during the assessment period. IQAC has encouraged the respective departments of the college to sign MOUs with the other institutions for resources exchange. IQAC succeeded at signing six MOUs during the assessment period.
